FRONT OFFICE

Good news!!! We no longer have a Waiting List for new members to join the VWC. Everyone who was on the Waiting List has been contacted and invited to join. We began

contacting those on the Waiting List on November 10, 2022, and completed the contacts on February 28, 2023. As a result, 179 new members have joined so far and more are joining each week. If you are asked about how long our Waiting List is or hear anyone talking about how long it takes to become a VWC member, please tell them that there is no more Waiting List. Any Villager who desires to become a VWC member should come to either of our shops with their Villages ID card and the new member fee of \$275 and they can join on the spot.

New members now choose their Certification training dates on our website. Thank you to Hans Zassenhaus for putting the scheduling programs together for us. Certification training is split into two days, both of which take place at Brownwood on Tuesdays. The first day is Classroom training which covers information about the club, membership requirements, shop safety, educational opportunities, lumber information, and a tour of the Brownwood shop. The second day (a week or two after Classroom training) is Shop training. This is training in the shop on the safe and proper use of our equipment. Upon completion of Shop training, new members are certified to work in the Brownwood shop. New members are also encouraged to get certified at Rolling Acres so they can take classes and/or monitor there. Certification training is held at Rolling Acres every Thursday at 11:30 am, 12:45 pm, or 2 pm. Lastly, the new members must take monitor training at the shop at which they are scheduled to monitor.

I would like to thank all the members of the Front Desk Staff for the time and effort they put into processing so many new members in such a short time while continuing to handle all their other tasks. Thanks goes, too, to Richard Masterson's Certification team for their dedication to training so many new members.

At Brownwood, we have been looking for ways to reduce wait time and congestion in the front office. We have added an auxiliary computer monitor so that we can multi-task to work on two transactions at the front desk (thank you, John Sullivan, for setting this up for us). Please bear with us as staff members learn how to make the best use of that new capability. We are also exploring other options to better handle the workload.

Our IT team is working on automatically feeding data for new member, dues, and classes payments from the Front Desk app to Lightspeed (our financial system). This will reduce the time we currently need to process our new members into the club as well as reduce the time required for class enrollments and dues payments while increasing accuracy. Thanks to our IT team (Dick Hartley and Steve Tarpley), improvements like this are being made. Dick, Steve, and Bill Hecht are also working on improving the quality of the member pictures we have on file and storing them more efficiently. We may need to ask some members to have their pictures re-taken due to poor quality of the original photograph. Please cooperate with the Front Desk Staff if you are asked to take a new photograph.

You can see that it takes MANY members working together just to handle administrative and IT work for the club. In addition, we have functions such as education support,

instructors, shop management, maintenance personnel (Blue Badge and Yellow Badge), safety, toy making and management, special projects – all of these groups are in need of more volunteers. If you can devote some time (even a few hours a month will help) to any of these groups, please contact the group manager. If you don't know who that is, ask around or come to the front desk – we can tell you.

The Elves and Painters continue their work to meet our client needs.

On the production side we have made 1,915 Toys through the end of February.

We continue to work with Woodworking Technology on issues with Rolling Acres CNC. We making progress on correcting the issues that are creating assembly issues for us. They have also been very helpful in programing and running a new project for us. The Rolling Acres Laser is working well now and the Lumber Department has come up with a replacement for Baltic Birch plywood that appears to resolve the cutting problem we were having for several months.

We are also anxious to see if the new Laser at Rolling Acres will help with our puzzle production issues.

On the shipping side we have made six shipments totaling 1,231 toys with a donation value of \$7.458 at the end of February. We have made one shipment containing 400 toys with a donation value of \$1.200 in March.

I want to thank Joe Stone and his Wednesday Euchre Group their continued support of our Toy Project. They provided us with a cash donation of \$712.00 and a check for toy sales of \$35.00. Their efforts are greatly appreciated!

Our Toys on the Square Project continues at Spanish Springs with our next outing coming on Tuesday March 7th from 5 – 8:30 pm. Please come out and support the Toy Team.
