




Stained Glass

Website

There have been some reports that the **Safari** web browser operating on mobile devices reports that there are "Too Many Redirects" and thus, cannot display our home page. This is the result of our having many links on each of our pages, including the Home page. However that condition can *normally* be corrected by clearing the Safari history and cookies. This can be cone by selecting Settings application, navigating to the Safari application and then navigating to a selection that clears stored browser information *and* closing all tabs. If this does not work, my suggestion is to switch to a more modern browser application such as *Microsoft Edge* or *Firefox*.

I strongly suggest that our members *not* register an alternate user name to your email address (which is the VWC default standard). This "alternate" login will provide access to members-only information; but has the unintended effect that this new account will *not* transfer your other privileges, such as access to one of the various scheduling applications on the website.

The lumber department recently acquired over 1,400 board feet of hard maple at a very low price. It was delivered Friday, February 9 at 3:30 PM by one of Santa's elves driving an 18 wheeler Hood distribution green sleigh and split between the Rolling Acres and Brownwood locations.

The hard maple shorts are S3S , 4 to 8 inches wide and 6 to 7 feet long. The selling price is 4.50 a board foot.

The Elves and Painters continue their work to meet our client needs, supported by the return of two elves from long term medical absences.

On the production side we have made 1,129 Toys so far this year.

We are experiencing production problems with the Rolling Acres Laser and the Rolling Acres CNC. We are working both of these issues with the Woodworking Technology and the Lumber departments. We are also anxious to see if the new Laser at Rolling Acres will help with our puzzle production issues.

On the shipping side we have made four shipments totaling 1,022 toys with a donation value of \$3,920. We are currently working on one additional shipment containing 329 toys with a donation value of \$3,280.

Our Toys on the Square Project continues at Spanish Springs with our next outing coming on Tuesday March 7th from 5 – 8:30 pm. Please come out and support the Toy Team.




Safety


WHAT'S THE SKINNY MINNIE?

Reorg, reorg., what is going on? The Maintenance Department is changing. The challenge of trying to provide maintenance support for two shops, organize Blue and Yellow volunteers, keep supplies coming and equipment running mandated a change of how the department was organized and conducted its business. Supporting two facilities requires standardizing how work is performed and organized. The least efficient

approach would be to have each maintenance shop work independently but each one would still require its own budgeting, parts ordering, scheduling and record keeping and maintaining repair histories etc.

More importantly, there are only so many volunteers. The club has many functions that need volunteers but the maintenance department needs someone with mechanical ability and willingness to, as they say, 'do the time'. There are only so many that have these characteristics and who want to volunteer. Standardizing the department's functions, procedures, duties and business activities maximizes the productivity and ability of those who volunteer to 'getter done'.

The organizational chart displays how the department is going to be structured starting March 1st. You will notice Rolling Acres (RA) is broken out functionally in greater detail. That's because the Club is fortunate enough to have more individuals with in-depth experience at RA to lead these areas. As Brownwood operations continue to mature and volunteer staff increases, the same RA breakout will be established there. Bottom line, it's a work in progress BUT the club is lucky to have the individuals designated in the org chart that want to take on the task and challenge. They stood up and said "I'll give it a try" so help them and the Club to be even more successful in the future!

President's Feb 2023 Report

We are in the middle of the snowbird season and overall, both shops are doing well. Our shop database that does the checking in and checking out of folks as they enter/leave the shop has been showing on average about 10-15 more members in our BW shop then RA. This was expected as most of our new members are living in the newer sections of The Villages. As I have gone around and looking to see how things are it also appears both shops are quite comfortable with how many are in the shop at the same time.

As I have said before this year's budget was based on 1700 total paid members. We about 1500 members now and it appears we will hit the 1700 number in 2-3 months. Below is the membership numbers as of our Feb Membership meeting.

New members in 2023 - 73

On Wait List who have not been contacted yet - 257

On Wait List who have been contacted - 560

On Wait List who have joined since we changed our procedure on 11/10/22 – 102

At our February Membership meeting Voytek from Special Projects gave us a 10 minute or so briefing on the Special Projects in regards to just what they do and how they contribute to the shop. It was a great briefing and I have below a couple of the points he made.

- We are supporting our club by helping the residents of The Villages through sharing of the talent, knowledge and experience in repairs and custom woodworking projects.
- We are helping other organizations inside and outside of Villages by fulfilling their charitable requests.
- We are helping other departments of our club by building custom projects per their needs.
- Helping club members by "building upon learning".

In addition, here are the numbers from 2022 showing their total contribution etc.

I also want to mention that with the increased membership our need for more training classes etc has grown a lot.
