Lumber

Stephen Yovan, Manager Lumber report on relative wood hardness

I would like to thank Hugh Pace of the Lumber Department for putting this report together.

The Lumber department gets frequent questions on the hardness of various species of lumber. There are at least two methods to determine this value. One is the density of the wood using its specific gravity value relative to water. Lumber with a specific value greater than 1.0 will not float and therefore is harder, while the lower its specific gravity value, the better it floats and is relatively softer. The second is using the Janka scale.

The Janka scale is used to determine the relative hardness of particular domestic or exotic wood species. The Janka test measures the amount of force required to embed a 0.444" steel ball into the wood to half of its diameter. Woods with a higher rating are harder than woods with a lower rating. The scale used in the table is pounds-force.

Toys

Since our last report, the Elves and Painters are continuing to work hard to produce the toys to support our client's 2022 requirements.

On the shipping side, in April we made three shipments of 590 toys with a donation value of \$2,750. Thus far in May we have already made one shipment of 400 toys with a donation value of \$1,200. This brings our 2022 shipping totals to 2,952 toys with a donation value of \$15,610. We are working on four more shipments for May which will have another 650 toys and an additional donation value of \$7,600.

As we look at the production side of the ledger, we continue to have equipment issues, we have still not gotten delivery of our replacement for our large horizontal sander, it's now scheduled for delivery in mid-June! We appreciate being allowed to use alternate equipment in the shop until ours' is back up and running. We were still able to produce 650 toys for the April bringing our total produced so far this year to 4,073 toys.

The Toy Team returned to Spanish Springs Town Square on Tuesday April 19th. Where we had a good night generating \$368.00 in sales and another \$75.00 in donations. In addition to the toy sales and donations, we always have an opportunity to talk with folks about the Club and answer questions about the things we do, courses we provide, and other community services that the we provide. I encourage members to come out and support the Toy Team.

We moved to Brownwood Paddock Square for our Thursday May 5th session and had a very successful evening. After a slow start we had total Toy sales of \$360.00 and donations \$52.00. We had a number of Shop members show up to see our display and talk, including our President. We also had a number of visitors who stopped to talk about the Toy project and other things that we do to support the community.

As usual we will take the next three months summer months off and return in September on Thursday the 8th, again at Brownwood Paddock Square.

Doing It the Right Way

If you are sanding in the shop using palm or belt sanders or doing it by hand use the downdraft tables! Sanding creates fine dust that not only can cause breathing problems

but if it is not collected in some manner while sanding impacts those around you and migrates throughout the room. Cindy Greenberg, Steve Lehosky and Rhfy Cancel are doing it the right way – using a downdraft table. Rolling Acres has them as well and the same reasoning applies to those sanding there.



New Stuff!!

For those who call Rolling Acres their home shop, two new Grizzly saws have been installed. They are the same ones you will find at Brownwood. The "old" saws are going to Brownwood. The one that is still in working order will be placed by the other saws. The increase in building the shelf project, cutting wedges for segmented bowls and ripping stock for cutting boards are causing members who are not doing these projects to wait for a saw. The other saw will be dedicated to producing card holders, slant boards and other products the club offers to the public. It will not be used for any other work in the shop. Thanks to Dave Adamovich, Walt Chekay, Neal Leeds and Dave Makarewicz for getting the saws online and Bob Behrens who is making various jigs for the saws.

Missing Tape Rules

In each shop there is a common member tool drawer containing various donated tools. The donated tape rules at Brownwood are missing. So, Brownwood tape rules have been moved from the common tool drawer to the Crib for member checkout. Tool donations are appreciated. Attention Blue Badgers and Monitors

The picture to the right shows how the compressor tank condensation bleed valves at Brownwood are supposed to be positioned. Plain and simple DO NOT CHANGE THE VALVES! Morning opening checkoff sheets for Monitors or Blues do not list moving the

valves around and yet someone recently did that! Rolling Acres is different. The bleed valve needs to be slightly opened each morning. Many times, someone from the maintenance team takes care of it but, it needs to be checked.

Woodworking Technology

The news from the Woodworking Technology Department is the replacement of the RA CNC. We have purchased a slightly used Nextwave Shark HD510 from a couple needing to get out of woodworking due to medical reasons and we have sold our first CNC machine, the China 6040, to a deserving, talented, VWC member.

The HD510 has only a 24"x24" bed, slightly larger than the China 6040 (15x22). But Nextwave offers an upgrade kit that will increase the Shark to a 24"x48" bed. We will pursue that if the interest deems it to be appropriate.

The machine has some upgrades. It has a 2HP water cooled spindle vs. using a hand held router. It can be operated from a pendant or from a PC. If operated from a PC there are additional capabilities.

The BW Maverick is still the more powerful and versatile machine, but there is one feature the Shark can do that the Maverick cannot. It is called Virtual Zeroing Unlimited. Let me explain by an example. You have a chair with a curved upper backrest rail. You would like to carve something on the curved board. The Shark allows you to take numerous readings (unlimited) to plot the geometry of the curved board, and then use that data to carve on that surface as if it were flat. With the Maverick you would need to create a model that represented the curved surface and then carve on the board as if it were the model. (more complicated)

The purchase of the Shark included a copy of Vectric Aspire, a \$2,000 high end modeling software package. It can be transferred only once. VWC is that "only once" and Hans is in the process of completing the transfer.

Additionally, how we certify operators will change. No longer will you be required to certify on the RA CNC (a stepping stone to the Maverick) before requesting certification on the BW CNC. The two machines are both CNCs but operate differently. I hope the user group concept of each E511 class will continue, but now training and practicing together to learn both the RA machine and the BW machine, and then the classmates seeking certification on either or both machines.

The Laser is reported to be back to full capability, but it seems a shipment of plywood has been manufactured with materials that make it difficult/impossible to cut with our laser compared to previous lots of plywood.

Additionally, we are back in the soup with Corel. Registration of our 130 copies of CorelDraw have disappeared from Corel's registry. We are very disappointed with the support we are currently receiving from Corel. A sudden change that started last fall.

Pens for Troops: May 18 at 4pm at RA will turn our 3000th pen! Then 26 & 27 May, Thursday and Friday at 10am at both shops will have a Memorial Day push. The Club made over 3000 pens total and over 250 this year so far. Well done to all our pen turners!

Our snowbirds for the most part have departed for the summer as the number of folks in the either shop is lower than previous years. One afternoon last week we had 24 at RA and 27 at BW. Mind you these numbers are probably slightly higher than who was actually there as we always have folks, including me, that occasionally forget to sign out. We have never experienced overcrowding in the RA shop in the summer and with BW open now both shops will have plenty of room to do our projects etc.

Our membership numbers have reached 1300 members with over 500 on the waiting list. However, with many of the waiting list members gone for the summer we have been signing up folks for training who got on the waiting list this past January. So, our training continues, and I expect to see our membership grow to 1600 to 1700 by end of next year.

BW upgrades: The compressor issue we have had at BW is being solved. An additional compressor was installed and will be turned on sometime this next week. The new larger awning that covers the air handling system is being planned for installation later this month. When we get firm word on when it takes place, we will send out an email to all. The installation will require a good portion of the parking lot to be unusable as the crane will be there for 2 or 3 days. So, parking will be quite limited while this takes place as shown below.



Happy to announce 2 new table saws at RA, the old saws have been sent to BW. The old fully operational saw will be setup next to the other saws at BW and the other somewhat limited in use saw will be dedicated to the card and slant board team.

A couple of weeks ago I received an email from a Village resident that she and her husband had a CNC machine, fairly new, and due to her husband becoming terminally ill they would be selling it. It was quite attractively priced. Lowell Sundermann looked it over and felt it would be a good deal and a good upgrade for our CNC operation at RA. So, with the BOD's approval we purchased it and it is now setup at RA. We are seeing an increase in the number of members getting qualified on the use of this technology.

One of our Club members, Steve Gird, recently made 12 wooden boxes for his Dermatologist, Dr. Thi Tran, to hold Tesla charging adapters. Dr. Tran collects Teslas. Dr. Tran donated \$1300 for the project and Steve had about \$200 in supplies cost thus leaving the Club a cash donation for the shop of about \$1100. Steve coordinated with Jill Bulmash to laser the box lids with the Tesla symbol. The end product was very classy. I'd like to acknowledge the donation and the time spent by Steve and Jill on the project. In addition, we sent out a thank you note to Dr. Tran. Many thanks to our past president, Mike, for composing and sending of the thank you note.



Budget analysis. Due to the inflation rate and other things, we have been watching the budget closely these past few months. I can say right now that I'm comfortable with this year's budget as it is. But this is mainly due to the donations we have had this year. Many thanks go to our special projects team for the work they do and the donation funds that are generated there.

But as I have said before as our utility cost increases next year and with whatever happens with inflation, we are analyzing what we will need for next year's budget. More of this to follow in the next few months.
