

The Winter/Spring 2019 Course Descriptions and the Calendar are available both at the shop and on-line. Students must sign up at the shop or have any friend go to the shop to sign up for you. We do not take phone or internet registrations since payment is required at sign up to assure students' interest and there is no provision for credit cards at this time. Mail registrations are not practical with our limited staff.

You could make arrangements for any friend or another willing woodworker to sign up at the shop in person for you. This person will need to pay any fees at the time of sign up, so make provision for that. Also make sure that you meet the criteria for any prerequisites as your friend might not know that. If there are any alternates you would like if your first choice is full, let your friend know that as well.

Toys

Conway Williams, Manager The Toy Department Team has achieved another record year in 2018

I want to give my sincere thanks to all the Elves and to Jo Harlos and all the painters who make up the TOY TEAM, for an awesome job in the service of our clients in the Tri-County area during 2018.

On the production side we continue to achieve new heights!

- On November 6th we produced our 8000th toy for 2018, the first time we have ever achieved that level!
- On December 18th we produced our 9000th toy for 2018, another milestone.
- In December we produced 415 toys which brings our total produced in 2018 to <u>9,047</u> toys. That's 1,779 toys more than last year's record of 7,268 toys.

On the shipment side of the ledger we have also significantly increased our volume.

- We made 2 shipments in December which totaled 1,517 toys and an additional donation value of \$10,735.
- This means that we shipped 8,326 toys in 2018 with a donation value of \$64,795.00!

Another note of interest is that since 2001 and the existence of the VWC building, our members have now produced <u>75,057</u> toys thru the end of 2018!

WHATS NEW

#2 MORSE TAPER STRONG BORE MODULAR BORING SYSTEM:



The strong bar system is a series of 3" sections, or extensions, when needed for pepper mills or starter bores for deep hollowing for hollow form vessels.

It is constructed of thick ¾" diameter steel and mounts directly into the tail stock which means there is no need for a Jacobs chuck. It can be used with any 3/8" shank Forstner bit or any other type of drilling tool with a standard 3/8" shank. It is modular and can extended (5", 8" & 11") simply by adding extensions to the standard assembly



 Thread extension section into taper adaptor and secure in place by tightening together using a 5/8" wrench and tightening the set screws. NOTE; When disassembling make sure to loosen set screws before un-threading sections.



- 1. Thread Forstner Bit holder extension and secure in place by tightening together using a 5/8" wrench and tightening the set screws. **NOTE**; When disassembling make sure to loosen set screws before un-threading sections.
- 2. Insert desired bit into the

3. Forstner bit holder and secure in place by tightening both set screws in Forstner bit holder.



4. Insert assembly into tailstock of lathe and firmly seat assembly into tail stock. **WARNING:** Failure to seat assembly into taper firmly may cause the assembly to rotate when boring.

When disassembling be careful not to lose any of the set screws, return to the tool crib.

ROUTER SAFETY TIPS:

- > Few will argue that the router is one of the handiest, most versatile power tools in the shop.
- However, because of its high operating speeds and horsepower (most routers run at between 18,000 and 25,000 rpms. and offer between 1hp and 3hp of brute power), failure to follow proper safety procedures can make the router one of the most dangerous tools in the shop. By following these safety rules for router safety, you should have no problem:

GETTING STARTED

- > Your brain is the most influential tool in your workshop. ("TAKE TWO") Think your cuts and movements before you power up your router and begin your cut(s).
- Dress properly, wear short-sleeve shirts or long sleeve shirts with rolled- up cuffs. Wear a shop apron or tight clothing. Make sure that your hair, jewelry, etc., will not become entangled with any moving parts of the router.
- Always unplug the router before installing, changing or removing router bits.
- Do not use mounted abrasives, carving burrs, drills, or other non-routing tools and cutters in routers just because they have shanks that are the same size as the router's collet.

> Use a router table and fence when feasible.



- > Proper alignment of the fence and pilot.
- Avoid shaping small stock. Instead, shape a larger piece and reduce its size afterwards. If you must shape a small piece, build an appropriate jig or secure the work within the jaws of a wooden handscrew clamp. If you're using a router table and your workpiece is too small to grip safely during an operation, use double stick tape or a dollop of hot melt glue to mount it to a larger piece of scrap stock, giving you added control.

Woodworking Technology

The Laser appears to be up to full operational capacity due to the efforts for Jerry Leinsing and Dave Adamovich. Bob LaHarvway is returning to The Villages in January and will teach classes on CorelDraw and how to operate the laser January through April. One class per month, six students per class.

CNC classes will also resume in January. Class E503 will officially begin in January, and alternating classes of E501 and E502 will continue starting in February. Members completing E503 will be scheduled for one-on-one operator certification with Jerry or Lowell.

For those interested in having projects milled that have been designed, look to a list of certified operators posted by the CNC machine for you to contact. If you are interested in having someone design a project for milling, ask around for those that have completed E501 and E502 that might help you out. A listing of designers willing to offer their assistance will follow.

Corel Draw Update

Good news, not so good news concerning Corel Draw software.

Good news: Enough members have purchased the Corel Draw Educational version that we are soon to sell out the 50 copies we obtained from Corel Draw.

Not so good news: We don't see at this time that we can justify buying another 50 copies. The club runs a fairly high risk of being left holding the bag – while software changes by the moment.

Good news: Corel Draw will sell to our members, since we purchased a 50 copy license, and since we are a 501(c)(3), individual licenses for \$60.00 plus tax plus any administrative fees, if any, imposed by the club.

More Good news: If any member no longer cares to keep its copy of Corel Draw, it is legal to transfer the license to another member. A price would need to be worked out between the member and the seller, and the club must remove the seller's license from the Corel administrative system.

Warning: Do NOT confuse the Educational version being offered by Corel Draw with the Home and Student version available at Amazon, Staples, and elsewhere on the internet. They are not the same. Only the Educational version is a fully operational version of the \$499 retail version.

Stay tuned for further developments, but for now these are our options. How we will administer these options needs to be refined and to follow.
